KRS 237.110 - KENTUCKY CONCEALED CARRY LAW

On February 14, 2019, the Kentucky Senate passed SB150. It allows residents and nonresidents who are 21 years old or older who are otherwise able to lawfully possess a firearm, to carry concealed firearms without a permit. Open carry without a permit for both residents and non residents 18 years old or older was already legal as guaranteed by the Ky State Constitution.

- Kentucky "Permitless Carry" law takes effect until July 1, 2019
- Under the law anyone who can legally possess a firearm may carry it concealed without a permit/license.
- A healthcare facility may prohibit person(s) and/or employees from carrying concealed or open deadly weapons on the premises. This does not include prohibition in personal vehicles.
- The law clearly states no person or organization, public or private, shall prohibit a person from possessing a firearm, ammunition or other deadly weapon in his or her vehicle.
- The building must post signage at entrances stating that carrying concealed or open carry weapons on the premises is prohibited.
- The law listed person(s) who <u>may</u> carry weapons concealed or open carry on their person in <u>all locations and at all times</u>. This list includes: peace officers, correction officers, county attorney, judges, and commonwealth attorney. This includes both active and retired person(s).
- Carrying a concealed or open carry weapon onto our premises is <u>not</u> a criminal act although the person must remove the weapon if he or she wish to remain in the facility.
